

'Old' Wolfpack soldiers top W. & L. Generals

It was the same old story yesterday as the old soldiers from the Mount Washington Lacrosse Club, seasoned in many campaigns, sloughed through the mud and the youthful Generals of Washington and Lee University for an 11-to-8 victory at Norris Field.

The two teams employed contrasting styles on offense. Washington & Lee fired only when it saw the whites of the eyes of Dave Creighton, the Mount Washington goalie, while the Mounts fired at will, occasionally at the Generals' net where Charlie Brown stood firm.

It was Brown who kept the club team from making a runaway of the game with 21 saves as the Mount Washington Wolfpack attempted 70 shots.

"Their goalie was tough," said coach Joe Seivold of the winners. "But we took a lot of bad shots, too. The surprising thing about W. & L. is that they didn't quit."

"We thought we had them a couple of times and apparently let up. I don't like to see that, but it happened."

"I was pleased with our defense in the second half," said Jack Emmer, the losing coach. "After they got 8 goals in the first half we held them to just 1 for most of the second half before they got the final 2 in the last minute."

Only five Generals scored, led by Rob Morgan, a senior attackman from West Chester, Pa., who scored 3 goals in the first half. Ten members of the Wolfpack scored, with midfielder Jim Ulman, former University of Virginia star, throwing 2 into the net.

One of the ten Wolfpack scorers was Doug Radebaugh, All-America faceoff man from the University of Maryland.

The surprising thing about Radebaugh's performance was that he scored, but that he played at all. Seven weeks ago Radebaugh broke a bone in his right leg while skiing in Utah. Thursday he practiced with Mount Washington for the first time, and yesterday he won 16 of 21 faceoffs, besides playing a lot of midfield for the Wolfpack.

"He got the game ball," Seivold said. "He'll be better after he rounds into shape."

"I'm just glad it was a small bone in the back of my leg," said Radebaugh. "I'm not in the best shape but I will be."

If it was surprising that Radebaugh played, then it was amazing that Carl Ortmann also played. Ortmann, who is in his 30's, was playing against one of his former pupils at Friends School, Jay Sandler.

Ortmann also scored a goal and said, "You're never too old to play," as his team-mates called him granddad.

After pulling away to a 4-1 lead, the Wolfpack ran afoul of Morgan's 3-goal effort, which tied the game 4-4 with 2:07 gone in the second period.

The next 4 goals were from the sticks of Mount Washington, giving the club team an 8-4 half-time lead.

Near the 10 minute mark of the fourth period, W. & L. cut the Mount lead to 9-7, but again, 2 quick goals took the pressure off the defending club lacrosse champions.

Last year the Mounts beat the Generals by the same 3 goal spread, 9 to 6.

Washington & Lee was plagued by poor passes, but that is correctable with more practice. The Mounts' stick-work also was not up to par and before they can hope to repeat as champions, they will have to get more offense out of their attack unit.

Gene Fusting, now an assistant coach with Mount Washington, could make a return as a crease attackman. Fusting, the fastest stick in the game, would be a positive addition to the Wolfpack scoring.

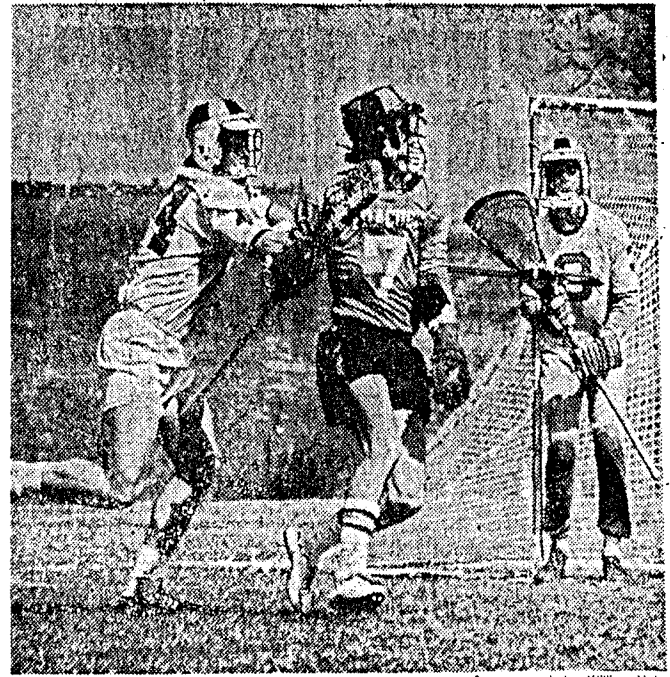
MLC ten will face Grasmick today

Freshman Tom Dunlap made 14 saves in the UMBC goal, while Clement Murray had 9 saves for Syracuse.

The Orangemen, loaded with upstate New York and Long Island talent, jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the first two minutes as Abbott and Donahue scored unassisted goals.

UMBC then scored 5 unanswered goals, 3 by Duffy, in the next 9 minutes for a 5-2 edge. But the Orangemen came back to gain a tie at 5-5 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter was all Syracuse as Abbott scored on a feed from Barry Powless shortly after the opening face-off, and the visitors built a 2-goal edge at halftime.

The Retrievers got a goal from Tim Coughlin and 2 from Mark Hofmeister to take a 10-9 lead early in the third period before Ziegler scored on an extra-man play for a 10-10 tie.

Duffy, however, scored unassisted, Mark Hahn tallied on a feed from Vince Brulinski and Hofmeister pumped home a goal on a pass from Duff for a 13-10 UMBC lead, and Syracuse never got closer than 2 the rest of the way.
